

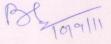

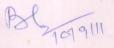

2.1 Curricular Aspects:	 The Syllabus prescribed by S.V. University, Tirupati, is followed. Locally relevant courses may be implemented.

2.1.5 Best Practices in Curricular Aspects (If any):	 Region specific Add on Courses are in practice. IGNOU and Dr. BRAOU Study Centre are functional.
2.2 Teaching-Learning & Evaluation:	
2.2.1 Admission Process and Student Profile	 Admission process is transparent. Reservation policy of Government of Andhra Pradesh is followed. Students from Socio-economically disadvantaged groups, rural areas and physically challenged are admitted.
2.2.2 Catering to the Diverse Needs:	 UGC sanctioned Remedial Coaching Centre is functional. Tutorial classes need to be strengthened. Mentoring mechanism needs further strengthening.
2.2.3 Teaching-Learning Process:	 Lecture method is supplemented by technology in the teaching learning process. ICT based teaching may further be stenghtened. Annual academic plan is in place.
2.2.4 Teacher Quality:	 Almar academic plan is in place. 30% of Permanent Faculty members are with Ph.D. Degree. About 50% of teachers are appointed on clock hour /temporary basis. Nineteen teachers attended different seminars / workshops during last five years. Some teachers have got local and state level awards / recognitions.
2.2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms:	 Evaluation process is as per S,V University Regulation. Continuous evaluation is yet to be made operational. Students' progress is yet to be monitored systematically

2.3 Research, Consultancy & Ex	tension:
2.3.1 Promotion of Research:	The Departments of Commerce and Chemistry are recognized as Research Centres. Two Faculty members have got University recognition for guiding research at Doctoral level. The research culture needs to be promoted.
2.3.2 Research and Publications Output:	 Four UGC sanctioned research projects are in progress. Earlier one Major and four Minor research projects were completed Sixteen articles have been published in different refereed journals by the teachers. The College may take up locally relevant research projects and from other agencies like ICSSR and DST etc.
2.3.3 Consultancy:	 Department of Computer Science is engaged in remunerative consultancy. The Faculty is yet to become competent to undertake consultancy.
2.3.4 Extension Activities:	 One NCC unit for both girls and boys and two NSS units are doing good work. The college has initiated linkage with the local NGOs. Six outreach programmes were organized by six different departments during last five years.
2.3.5 Collaborations:	 Collaboration with state, national and international agencies are to be initiated.
